



British Values Statement

Whitmore Primary School and Nursery actively supports and promotes fundamental British Values. Pupils are made aware of the importance of these values and how they affect their daily lives. These British Values are defined and taught as follows:

Democracy

- Children involved in Democratic processes e.g. choosing school councillors, Head Boy and Head Girl, rewards and incentives, etc

The Rule of Law

- Understanding responsibility in school in terms of behaviour and learning attitude.
- Pupils roles in school x School vision and values—known and articulated by school community members

- What went wrong reflection following behaviour incidents
